Special attractions will be a covered wagon displayed by owner Steven Howe and a reenactment by Rick Hathaway and John Kindt.

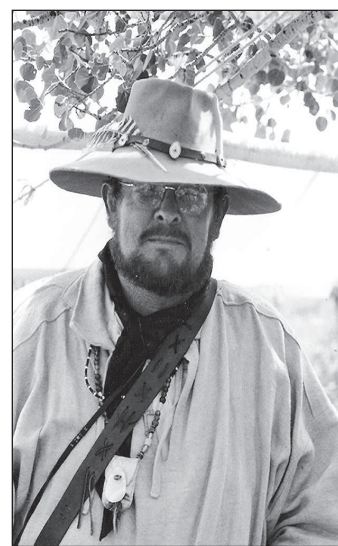
These reenactors will show and explain the tools, skills and clothing used by Rocky Mountain fur trappers and traders in the 1840s.
